Mr. Maggin's first gift to the Princeton University Library was made in 1944. During the following years he presented many items of interest and importance, particularly in the fields of English and American literature and history, and assisted the Library in the purchase of additions to its special collections. Exhibited in this case is a small selection of his gifts, to suggest the extent of his generosity.

John Witherspoon. Autograph letter signed to Benjamin Rush, London, April 2, 1768.

Benjamin Rush, of the Class of 1760, was instrumental in persuading Witherspoon to leave his native Scotland in 1768 and accept appointment as Princeton's sixth president. This letter forms part of a series of letters written by Witherspoon to Rush in 1767-68 published by the Library in 1953 in a volume entitled John Witherspoon Comes to America. Both Witherspoon and Rush were signers of the Declaration of Independence.

Exhibited with a copy of John Witherspoon Comes to America, opened to page 72, on which the letter is printed.

Presented by Mr. Maggin in 1944, his first gift to the Library.

A letter patent, in Latin, dated December 20, 1385, with the Great Seal of Richard II of England.

The document concerns a chantry established a few years earlier.

Joannes Meder. <u>Quadragesimale</u> <u>de</u> <u>filio</u> <u>prodigo</u>. Basel, Michael Furter, 1495.

A theological work by a Franciscan containing 17 full-page woodcuts which are considered among the best of the period.

Presented by Mr. Maggin in 1947.

Guillaume Budé. <u>De Asse et partibus eius</u>. Venice, Aldus, 1522.

A treatise on money by one of the foremost French humanists of the 16th century. This edition is dedicated to the famous bibliophile Jean Grolier.

Stacy Beakes. A mathematical notebook of 230 folios compiled in 1721 and 1722 by a New Jersey schoolboy when he was but 14 and 15 years old.

An unusual specimen of early 18th-century American calligraphy.

Presented by Mr. Maggin in 1950.

Wilkie Collins. "The Ghost's Touch."

Autograph manuscript of a short story by the author of <u>The Woman in White</u> and <u>The Moonstone</u>.

Presented by Mr. Maggin in 1955.

John Galsworthy's first four books, published under the pseudonym "John Sinjohn": From the Four Winds (1897), Jocelyn (1898), Villa Rubein (1900) and A Man of Devon (1901).

Presented by Mr. Maggin in 1962.

A collection of eleven Shakespeare quartos presented by Mr. Maggin and his son Donald L. Maggin '48 in 1968.

Exhibited with an article by Gerald Eades Bentley entitled "Eleven Shakespeare Quartos," The Princeton University Library Chronicle, Vol. XXX, No. 2 (Winter, 1969), 69-76.

Love's Labor's Lost. 1598.

First edition. The first Shakespeare play to be printed with the author's name on the title-page.
